The Paradox of Participation. The Power of Domination and the Power of Change

Abstract: My paper focuses on the effects of participatory practices in the contemporary process of democratization. On the one hand, these practices were created in order to compensate for the shortcomings of the representative model (paradigm), giving more power to the people and setting a basis for real social change.
